Remember Friday night is the FREE silent auction. There will be a FREE beer for all attendees and the opportunity to bid on


some outstanding snow trips. I will be easy to locate at the Convention as I will be the MC for the auction. It should be another FWSA outstanding event.

SKI AREA ISSUES

-Booth Creek

Booth Creek founder and former Vail owner George Gillett announced he was stepping down as CEO but would purchase Grand Targhee, ID from Booth Creek for a reported \$11 million. Gillett will remain as Chairman of the Board.

Rumor is that Booth Creek will sell off Bear Mountain, CA, Waterville Valley & Cranmore, NH, and The Summit at Snoqualmie, WA while keeping Northstar & Sierra-at-Tahoe, CA and Loon Mtn., NH. *

-Colorado Ski Country USA

Colorado Ski Country USA's 25 member resorts reported a 9.3% drop in skier visits through February 29 from the previous year. Colorado's skier visits were off by 17% at the end of December because of a lack of snow early in the season. Y2K related worries and inflated prices were also blamed for

the drop in numbers. Steamboat was the only Colorado resort ahead of last years numbers. *

—Lake Placid's Olympic Bid

Lake Placid is looking for an Olympic Hat Trick by exploring an Olympic bid for the Adirondack— for 2022.

DISABLED TEAM USSA

The USSA Judicial Committee ruled that the USSA board made the decision to disenfranchised the Disabled Team without a quorum of its acting directors. In a subsequent meeting, the USSA board voted unanimously not to ratify the proposed jettison of the Disabled Team. ❖

JET TRAGEDY IN **ITALY**

The U.S. government will pay the lion's share in a \$40 million settlement to the families of victims killed in Italy on February 3, 1998 when a Marine jet cut a gondola cable sending 20 people to their deaths. Each family will receive nearly \$2 million with 75% to be paid by the U.S. and 25% by the Italian government. The ratio was set by NATO. ❖

SKIER RESPONSIBLE

🔰 The Supreme Court ruled on a skier accident that occurred 3 years ago in Vail that resulted in death when one skier collided with and killed another. This precedent setting decision will make skiers and snowboarders criminally liable for actions on the slopes that injure others.

SNOWBOARD STRIP

—Gotcha Glacier

Gotcha Glacier, an indoor snowboard and surf park being built in Anaheim, CA, has signed a management agreement with Mammoth Mountain to oversee all snow-related operations-

grooming, snowmaking, terrain park, ski and snowboard rentals and lessons. ❖

-Burton's Letter

Burton has stirred up a hornet's nest by sending out a letter asking 30 binding manufacturers to either pay the company a royalty on any binding sold with a three-hole compatible rotor disk or stop offering them. *

PRICE WAR ERUPTS OVER LIFT TICKETS

All deals expire some time this spring. Incidentally, ski areas don't see this as a pass war but as a permanent way of marketing.

Winter Park and Copper Mountain (two areas under different ownership) announced an unprecedented "Rocky Mountain Super Pass" for \$349 that allows unlimited skiing for 2000-2001 at both resorts.

Vail countered with a \$299 "Colorado Pass" offering skiing/riding at Keystone, Arapahoe Basin and Breckenridge and up to 10 days at Vail and Beaver Creek.

Copper later announced a Copper-only unlimited season pass for \$249—\$50 off this season's best deal.

Next up were the medium-sized ski areas, such as Loveland, which cut its already-announced season pass pricing from \$350 to \$249 for an unlimited adult pass.

Next on deck were "Buddy Pass" deals, with Winter Park setting the early standard with the "Everyday Four Pack" where four friends (or associates) could purchase passes for \$800 total (\$200 apiece).

Mammoth Mountain is offering a season pass for \$375 available for purchase until July 4 (or when sold out). ❖

ALASKA, THE GREAT WHITE LAND TO THE EAST

Alveska

Twelve club leaders in the Far West Region (those with trip decision making power or a publishing track record) were hand picked by Tia Froehle, Director of

Sales at Mt. Alyeska Ski Area, to look over this resort in Alaska. The resort, located in Girdwood, 40 miles east of Anchorage, is reached via the Turnagain Arm, a national scenic highway affording one of the most spectacular views in Alaska with everchanging tidal waters

and the rugged snow-capped Chugach mountain range. The word Alyeska, pronounced "Alley-Eske", is derived from the Aleut word meaning "great land of white to the east." The state name "Alaska" is also a derivative of this native word.

Alaska Airlines brought us all to Anchorage from Los Angeles, San Diego, Las Vegas, Orange and Phoenix. Nanc Wilson of the Anchorage Convention & Visitors Bureau was another key person who helped made this trip a success. Transportation was handled very capably by The Magic Bus who took control of all our travel needs. The first night we were guests of the very luxurious Hotel Captain Cook in the heart of Anchorage— a must for anyone visiting as it really adds to the feel and ambiance of the Alaskan experience.

For the next three days we were guests of the Westin Alyeska Prince Hotel which is a fabulous ski-in, ski-out property located on the mountain. There are a number of exceptional things you'll notice right away about the 307-room chateau-styled Alyeska Hotel, opened in August 1994 — the first-class and friendly staff, the variety of four-star cuisine, a fitness center, two lounges, a skier's bar, a fireside lobby, indoor swimming pool, indoor Jacuzzi, retail shops, meeting facilities,

The next two days were action packed as we experienced what the real Alaska is all about. **Chugach Express** provided us dog sledding tours. **Kenai Fjords Tours**

took a group whale watching on a 4.5 hour cruise. Alpine Air treated us to a ride and a glacial landing on a lake while flight seeing Alaska. Snowmobiles, which proved a bit traumatic for

a few of us, were provided for our group by **Alaska**

Snow Safaris. All I can say is if you have not been to Alaska before, it is an experience of a lifetime. A great trip for skiers and non-skiers alike.

February and March are the best times to ski Mt. Alyeska when the average temperature is 30°F (although the mercury has been known to drop to 0°F) and it stays light for 11 to 14 hours a day. Mt. Alyeska is a small resort by our standards but there's room for expansion — some of which has already been completed. There are 9 chairs, including the Tram from the Alyeska Hotel, accessing 60 runs which are mostly intermediate. What the statistics don't tell you is that you can find a dozen different ways down each run that are

more difficult. There's some really extreme stuff too — the Glacier Bowl, Lola's Leap (Lola said it wasn't pretty) and Gear Jammer. At 1000 acres, the area skis bigger than it is.



—Gone Hiking

During moderately strenuous exercise, your body needs a combination of fat, protein and carbohydrates (plus about 8 ounces of water every 20 minutes) to stay energized. For short hikes, pack trail mix, fruit, hard candy and crackers and nibble as you go. For longer hikes, add a substantial lunch, such as sandwiches, cheese, crackers and fruits, and eat when you start to feel hungry.

To save your back, pack heavier items low in the pack and close to your back, to better utilize your center of gravity. Pack snacks in re-sealable plastic bags and containers, drinks in non-glass water bottles. If you



are carrying food that needs to be chilled, a water bottle filled with half ice, half water, or a frozen ice pack, will help keep your provisions fresh. *

—Summer Ski Storage

Skis should be prepped for summer and stored carefully, At the very least, have your local ski shop put storage wax on you ski's bottoms so that the base material doesn't dry out. Ideally, you should get a complete, end-of-season tune, so you're ready to go when the snow starts flying again. Once tuned, stored your skis in a dry place. Hang them vertically so the tails don't sit on a floor where they can absorb moisture.

You should also have your technician lubricate and loosen the tension on your binding springs. This ensures good function and adds life to the bindings.

Boots also need end-of-season attention. Before storing them, remove the liners and dry them thoroughly. Then place them back in the shells, buckle the boots, and store them in a dry place. ❖
