THE ALLIANCE

I am writing this article on the train as I travel from Grenoble, France to Zurich, Switzerland. Everyone who joined us in Zermatt should be home by now. We had a safe and sound trip except for a few minor mishaps on the trip— nothing too serious except for some bumps and bruises

and sore knees. If you weren't there, you missed another great trip. Now to get on with what is being planned for 2002. Two trips are on the schedule for next winter.

Big White—

We are planning on joining up with LA Council on their trip to Big White in Canada. We are limited to only 30 people and already more than 30 people have expressed interest in going. Since money talks, if you would like to go on this trip, you will need to send a \$100 deposit to me within the week. The money will be fully refundable until we get the final price (currently estimated to be about \$900). We are planning to stay in some beautiful, new, ski-in, ski-out, 3 bedroom, 2.5 bath condos— each with their own outdoor hot tub. We plan to have a couple of two-room suites available for those who prefer more privacy. We will either be flying through Seattle (Alaska Air) or Vancouver (Air Canada) so it won't matter where you live since we will all meet up at one of those airports.

Les Deux Alpes—

Our Europe 2002 trips is back to France. The area chosen is Les Deux Alpes—about 2 hours from Grenoble and Lyon. Our trip dates will be March 1 - 9, 2002. This area is relatively unvisited by American but won't be for long. The mountain, by all estimates, is huge. It covers over 100 miles of ski runs not counting the unlimited and

excellent off-piste skiing. Whether you are a beginner or extreme skier or boarder, you will have plenty of runs to chose from. Your 6-day lift ticket (about \$140 this year) is also good for one day at Huez du Alpes and Serra Chevalier.

The snow fall is one of the largest in France, because of the glaciers in the area, which you can ski 365 days a year. The pricing is not in as yet but with our strong dollar and the change to the Euro in March 2002, it is surely going to be to our benefit. See page 7 for more details. We are accepting deposits now.

This trip will be limited to 80 persons max. Eating around town is relatively inexpensive for lunch or dinner. We are looking at Paris, for sure, and either Barcelona or Malta for our extensions. I will entertain any suggestions you may have. Prague was first suggested by someone on last year's trip so you know that I will listen and evaluate all ideas to see if it fits our niche. Send me some details with a good sales pitch.

Hall Sentenced in CO—

Nathan Hall, who was convicted of criminally negligent homicide in a collision on the slopes of Vail that took the life of a Denver man, was sentenced yesterday to 90 days in a county jail. Prosecutors requested a three-year sentence for the former Vail lift attendant, but instead had to settle for the three months, plus 240 hours of community service and financial restitution to the family of the victim.

During the next three years, Hall will be under supervised probation and will not be permitted to consume alcohol or drugs and he wil be unable to ski, unless it is part of a skier safety education program. Hall is planning on appealing his conviction and, in the meantime, remains free on bond. This case marks the first time someone has been found criminally negligent by a jury trial in a skier collision death.

Mammoth Suffers Brunt Of California's Energy Crisis —

A contract with Southern California Edison (SCE) is costing Mammoth Mountain a bundle in California's current energy crisis, according to a published report. Electric rates have jumped from 7 cents per kilowatt hour to \$9 per kilowatt hour 12 times since January 1. Because of the way Mammoth's contract with the utility company is structured, the resort pays a penalty for keeping the electricity on when SCE decides to cut power — in Mammoth's case, about \$20,000 a day to keep the lifts running. Mammoth is cutting back in other, non-essential areas to try to help compensate.

George Gillett to Purchase Canadiens—

The Montreal Canadiens announced yesterday the team and their home, the Molson Centre, will be sold to George Gillett, Jr. The founder of Booth Creek Ski Holdings will buy 80.1% of the controlling interest in the hockey team and 100 percent of the hockey arena from Molson Inc. in a deal worth \$275 million CDN. Molson will retain a 19.9% share in the team and is selling the major interest to "return to its brewing roots." Both sides feel the deal will lead to a rebuilding of the team. Gillett is committed to the Montreal Canadiens with the ultimate goal of restoring the stature of the franchise as the greatest team in hockey. Booth Creek Resorts, in an announcement of their own, said that this purchase is not being financed by the company.

Yellowstone Silence—

The National Park Service (NPS) has announced a ban on recreational snowmobiles in both Yellowstone and Grand Teton Parks, due to take full effect in 2003-2004. The Bush administration may try to reverse this decision, though they may not want a war with the environmental community quite so quickly. But if the ban does take place, the only over-snow transport will be heated enclosed snowcoaches with four-stroke engines. The parks may then become a Nordic Mecca.

Be sure to write your elected officials and let them know how you feel about the snowmobiling, noise & pollution.

WY To Tax Ski Lift Tickets—

Wyoming Legistative gave initial approval to a bill that would levy a 6% tax on ski lift tickets, golf, bowling, health club memberships and other recreational activities.

Our arrival in Zermatt was met with a blanket of fresh snow that didn't let up until the next morning when a full day of sunshine and powder was at our beckoning with a picture perfect day in the shadow of the spectacular Matterhorn. The price we paid for the snow was the comedy unfolding as our bus driver tried to put chains on the bus. First he had to call his office to find out where they were. Our first clue we were in trouble was the street shoes our driver wore (see photo). After three hours, we put the chains on the bus for him.

This pattern of perfect weather and conditions continued throughout the week with another dump of snow on Thursday. We couldn't have planned it better. The hotels, whether it was the 3, 4 or 5 star were more than overwhelming in the service we received. Those of us that stayed at the Mt. Cervin actually received more than we bargained for. Little did I know that we would be staying in one of the top ten hotels in the world (ed: obviously he didn't read his Information Package). Under normal circumstances, I could not afford this on any basis. This was one of those real coat & tie places (the Cervin provides great jackets) with the services to match. I really do hope in the future we can experience this kind of elegance again.

The Mt. Cervin also hosted our Welcoming and Farewell Parties at pool-side. The Walliserhof seemed to be the best meeting place for lunch, where their à la carte menu had a little bit of everything. My personal choice was the escargot, followed by pasta à la dente with garlic and oil.

After Zermatt, almost half the group continued on to Prague, Czech. All of us can actually say it was the best value dollar-for-crown we have ever experienced. The proof came at the end with the double the bags (people actually had to buy luggage to get all their new goodies home) on top of the already too much luggage our group brought with them. We took advantage of the good deals on crystal, garnetts and jewelry. Even I found myself succumb to the pressure. The half day tour was plenty helpful in pointing everyone in the right directions to explore and visit this amazing country.

Beers in Prague (home of the real original Budweiser) were about 50¢ a mug. Fine dining, with wine, ran about \$25 for two. The Garlic Soup was to die for. The Czechs have come a long way in the 12 years since the Iron Curtain was dropped. A beautiful old city with lots of history and charm was certainly another highlight of this all too short vacation.

STRETCHING—FIVE MINUTES TO BETTER SKIING

Every day we spend hours sitting, driving and standing— tasks that contract our muscles. On the slopes, tight muscles can cause the body to move incorrectly by forcing body weight and motion to shift to other groups of muscles.

Stretching before skiing signals the muscles that they are about to be used and helps elongate them, reducing tension and improving flexibility. Moguls will be less jarring to your knees when quadriceps are stretched and hamstrings relaxed, and turns will be easier with a more flexible back.

Keep your stretching routine simple, spending 15 to 20 minutes on the major muscle groups involved in skiing. Even five minutes daily can be effective. Establish a short stretching routine and be consistent with it. Always stretch when muscles are warm. Before stretching, walk around for two to five minutes while swinging your arms. Mild exercise raises the core body temperature and increases blood flow in the body, reducing the chance of pulling a muscle during the stretch.

Hold each stretch for 10 to 15 seconds, relaxing into the pose. Breathe rhythmically to soften any tension. Quiet your mind, and focus your attention on the spot where you feel the greatest stretching sensation. Stretching is not a competitive sport. Work at your own pace to ensure safety. Only hold stretches that are comfortable—never stretch to the point of pain, and always be in control of your movements. Never bounce while stretching—this can make you tighter or cause injury. Only a relaxed muscle will allow itself to be stretched.

Ski Twist Stretch —

Lie on your back with your right arm extended out to your side. Using your left hand, slowly pull your right knee across your torso, while keeping your right shoulder on the ground. Hold for 15 seconds, and then switch sides. This stretch stabilizes the lower back and trunk.

CHEF'S CORNER

Wine & Food Guide-

Red Meats— The rule of thumb is red wine with red meat. Try Cabernet, Merlot or Red Zinfandel.

Seafood— A dry, white wine, such as Chardonnay or Sauvignon Blanc, will taste best. However, rich meaty fish such as tuna, salmon or swordfish will be well complimented by a soft red wine, such as Pinot Noir or Merlot.

Poultry— A dry, white wine is usually your best choice with cream or butter sauces. Chardonnay is a classic match. With tomato sauce, try Cabernet, Merlot, Syrah, or Red Zinfandel.

Hot & Spicy Foods— The best type of wine to drink is an off-dry wine, such as White Zinfandel, Gewürztraminer or Johannisberg Riesling.



Cream Sauces—Serve Chardonnay. The bolder the dish, the richer and more oak aged the Chardonnay should be.

Herb-Rich Dishes— Foods prepared with herbs such as basil, oregano, thyme, etc., are well complimented with lighter, crisp wines, such as Sauvignon Blanc.

Fruit Sauces— A sauce made with cherries, raspberries or blackberries will taste great with a soft red wine, such as Merlot or Pinot Noir. If you are using tropical or citrus fruits like pineapple, bananas, apples or lemons, then serve Chardonnay or Sauvignon.

Casual Family Dining— Keep it simple. Serve wines that are priced under \$10. Experiment with red and white varietal wines that you have not had.

Wine & Cheese— When you are entertaining with cheese, serve a variety of wines and cheese together. Have a barrel aged Chardonnay, a full-bodied red and a sweet Gewürztraminer.

The Beach, Pool or Picnic— These occasions call for lighter and simpler wines. Buy a fruity Chardonnay or Merlot. Sweeter wines such as White Zinfandel or Gewürztraminer are always appropriate.

SNOWBOARD STRIP

Snowboard Ban Eased at Aspen—

Banning snowboarding seems very 1980s, but there are still a few holdouts (Aspen's Ajax, CO, Deer Valley, UT, Taos, NM and Alta, UT in the West and Perfect North Slopes, IN, Mad River Glen, VT).

Now one of them has cracked— Aspen has recently announced that its controversial ban on sideways sliders will be lifted starting 1 April 2001 (no April fools).

Snowboard Park Success—

There are six terrain parks at Snow Summit, CA. The biggest and "baddest" requires a special pass and parental consent to ride. The pass is the hottest ticket in town, and because kids have to fill out a bunch of forms, the resort gets their backgrounds and e-mail addresses.

Snowboarder numbers increase—

Snowboarding continues positive momentum, although at a slower rate of growth. Snowboarders were estimated to account for 26.4% of on-slope visits in 1999-2000. However, the 1.5% point increase this past season represents a slowdown from the 2.6% & 3.4% for previous years. •
