Learn to Ski and Snowboard Month

Bode Miller will join Glen Plake as Ambassador for Learn to Ski and Snowboard Month (LSSM). LSSM will take place during January and is a national initiative to get people on the slopes and in a lesson. More than 300 resorts throughout the U.S. are offering free or discounted programs directed at beginners and those with some experience.

Arizona Snowbowl

Arizona Snowbowl has won the latest round in its fight to install snowmaking, as the courts—this time a Federal District Court—have once again upheld Snowbowl's right to make snow with reclaimed water. Snowbowl expects to start construction in the Spring 2011.

Tamarack

The Idaho Land Board approved a deal between the Tamarack Municipal Association and primary creditor Credit Suisse to continue the resort's state lease deal through June 2011. The bankruptcy court still must approve the deal that would allow Tamarack to open for a 15-week season.

Kapuscinski Gains Full Control of Mountain High

Karl Kapuscinski, president and CEO of Mountain High Resort Associates LLC, has purchased all remaining shares in the Mountain High Resort tenant-operator firm, making him the sole owner of the company that leases the resort from CNL Lifestyle Properties. Kapuscinski is entering his fifteenth season as the resort's top executive.

Squaw Valley Purchase

KSL Capital Partners, LLC has closed its previously announced acquisition of substantially all of the shares of The Squaw Valley Development Company. The acquisition includes all facets of Squaw Valley USA ski operations, as well as the Village at Squaw Valley and related real estate holdings.

Northstar Purchase

Vail Resorts has purchased Booth Creek's management and operating contract of Northstar and now manages the resort operations as the tenant-operator, just as Booth Creek did previously. The lease is long-termed. As with other CNL resort properties, CNL owns the land and all improvements on it, i.e. the buildings, ski lifts, and snowmaking infrastructure are included.

Overall, CNL Lifestyle Properties is a non-traded real estate investment trust

He also praised the mountain environment saying that it is "an environment, which in a special way, makes us feel small, giving back to us the right dimension of our being creatures. It makes us capable of asking ourselves about the meaning of creation, of looking above, of opening ourselves to the Creator."

As we gear up for the season, the snow industry figures it will take all of the endorsements it can get. ♦

Prevent Ski Cancer

Far West has a program geared to increase our awareness of the sun's harm and what you can do to protect yourself. The campaign is geared towards children as you can see by their logo. So be sure to pass on the words.



- SLIP** on your helmet.
- SLOP** on some sunscreen.
- SLIDE** on your goggles.
- SLITHER** into the shade when possible.

Nutritional Advice for Skiers

Nutrition plays a crucial role in helping an athlete achieve optimal training results, but also recovering quickly. By applying a knowledge of the metabolic demands of skiing to nutritional strategies, you can reach peak performance.

Below is a list of guidelines that should be followed while at work, at home, or on the slopes.

- Eat **FRESH** nutrient dense foods. Keep junk and processed food at a minimum. These contain calories that the body does not use due to their low vitamin and mineral content.
- **EAT** every 3-4 hours to maintain energy levels, aid in recovery, and avoid that evening crash.
- Eat **COMPLEX CARBOHYDRATES** at a ratio of 2.5-3.5 grams per pound of body weight. For example, a 180 lb. male needs 450-630 grams of carbohydrates per day and a 120 lb. female needs 300-420 grams.

- Eat primarily raw and lightly steamed vegetables, yams, sweet potatoes, brown rice, and occasionally wheat bread and whole grain cereals as a major **ENERGY SOURCE** to fuel you. These foods are also a source of fiber, vitamins, minerals and phytonutrients.
- Choose **PROTEIN** sources from eggs, turkey, chicken, fish, and lean cuts of beef, tofu, and low fat cottage cheese.

Helmet Legislation

Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger first approved a bill that required under-18 skiers and boarders in the state to wear helmets, but then vetoed a companion legislation that would have required resorts to take a number of other actions to further safeguard visitors. Since the two bills were linked, the veto of the second means that the first won't become law, either.

Had the bills both passed, California would have the country's strictest laws regarding helmet use and ski safety.

Since ski resorts in California also already mark their ski area boundaries and trails with appropriate information, the governor thought the bill may place an unnecessary burden on resorts, without



assurance of a significant reduction in ski and snowboard-related injuries and fatalities

Senator Leland Yee, author of the bill requiring helmets for all skiers and riders under age 18, said he will reintroduce the helmet bill next year as a standalone measure. This bill had the support of the California Ski Industry Association, and will likely have that support again.

Pre-Season Ski Tune Up

You may have been working hard getting yourself in shape for ski season, but don't forget to have your skis tuned and your bindings checked before that first day on the snow. Rusty edges can make for some tough skiing. ♦

Snow Bike

Developed in France in 1991, the Snow Bike is a cross between a BMX bike and a snowboard.

Its extreme agility and durability allows it to handle any kind of spectacular move, whether in deep powder or on hardpack. It will even perform all of your favorite BMX moves in the snowpark.

The Skwal

The Skwal is a ski-snowboarding hybrid, which has gained something of a cult following. It was created by Patrick 'Thias' Balmain in 1992, who went on to set up his own company 'Thias' — the producers of Skwal.

It comes in lengths from 168-183cm and looks more like a long, thin monoski than a normal snowboard. One foot is placed in front of the other and you face the direction of travel, much the same as in water skiing.

Snow Kiting or Paraskiing

Snow Kiting is the latest winter sport. Large highly controllable foil kites are used to blast kite pilots along with just the power of the wind!

The 'Big Air' jumps that boarders and skiers are pulling off under the power and security of power kites are simply breath taking.

You'll need a lot of gear— your skis or board, a kite, as well as a harness, helmet, gloves and pads.

Monoskiing

The monoski came into fashion in the early '80s and was seen all over the mountains until the arrival of snowboards.

It's a double-width alpine ski with two bindings mounted side by side. A longer, broader ski is used for powder and a shorter, narrower ski for groomed snow. They are, however, notoriously unstable on straight schusses and hard work in firm or icy conditions.

You would find it difficult to rent or buy a monoski these days, despite attempts to revive the trend. Check out www.monoski.org.

Snow Funboards

Snow funboards are very similar to windsurfs and they are used to sail on snowy and icy plains. You'll need a lot of gear: a board, a boom and a short sail, as well as a harness, helmet, gloves and pads.

Speed Skiing

Feel the need for speed? Then speed skiing is the sport for you. 0-154 mph within ten seconds— only speed freaks need apply.

You'll need a polyurethane coated polypropylene suit, an aerodynamic helmet and skis that are 240cm long, specifically made for speed skiing.

You will need racing boots and bindings, custom-bent poles filled with 2lb. of lead, gloves that have leather grip and a rubber coating.

You will also need fire-retardant high-density foam back protection, so that if (or when) you fall, you don't burn your back. ◆

KIDS' korner

GOOD STUFF for the kids & grandkids

Things to know **BEFORE** you take the kids to the slopes

Kids Gear —

The obvious problem with getting children outfitted for the slopes is that they're always growing.

Don't be tempted to buy equipment too big for them to 'grow into' because it can make skiing difficult or even hurt your child.

Boots—

Ski boots should fit like trainers with enough room for toes to wiggle.

It's hard sometimes to get feedback from smaller children so, if you can, take the liner out of the shell to get a better idea of where their toes are.

Poles—

Kids don't tend to use them until they have at least learned the basics.

They are distracting and get in the way on lifts.

Bindings—

They should be high quality and have a DIN setting that goes low enough (maybe down to 0.5) for your child.

Always get a technician in a good ski shop to set the bindings.

Skis—

Children's skis tend to be shorter, softer versions of adult skis and the new shaped skis turn more easily than traditional straight skis.

It's a good idea to choose shaped skis for kids because they don't exert too much leverage on children's legs.

They're also shorter and therefore easier to turn and manage.

Length—

As with adult skis, you should take into account the child's weight, ability and aggressiveness when picking the correct ski length.

Rental shops should always consult parents about their child's ability.

Carving Skis—

Ski height should come between the top of the shoulder (for light kids) and eye level (for heavier ones).

Traditional Skis—

Up to 6 years old, skis should come to 6" below head height.

For 6 - 10 years old, the ski should be around head height.

Helmets—

It is mandatory for all children to wear a helmet at many resorts.

Make sure it fits properly and that your child can still see to the sides and hear clearly.

Buying Versus Renting—

For beginners and kids who ski infrequently, renting equipment is the best option.

It can be stressful and busy in a rental shop, so bring along some toys to keep the young ones amused.

At peak season, choice may be limited and sizes unavailable so, if you can, rent at home or rent in advance.

If you do decide to buy, many ski shops offer a buy back scheme where you can trade in old equipment for new well-fitting boots or skis. ♦

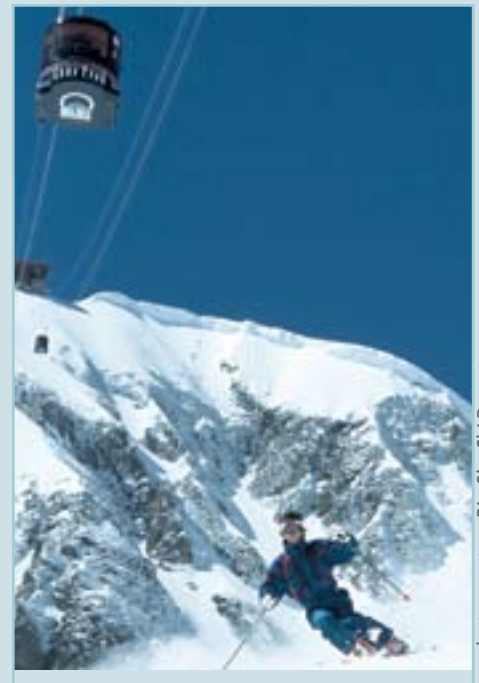
