

DON'T PUT IF OFF, BUY A HELMET. They are on sale now. I have to buy a new one. Also, had I not had the ear protection on my helmet (solid, not soft), I probably would have broken my jaw!

For anyone wondering about the fall—it was a freak thing. First run of the day, coming down Mt. Rose to the NW chair, making the turn, looking up to see where to dodge the snowboarders that constantly block the entrance, and WHAM! Making a right turn, caught an edge on the outside ski, threw me forward onto my head, not my face! I had no indication I was in trouble, it happened in a second!

It caused a small bleed on the brain, which is the reason I was in ICU for a night. It stopped and I should be fine. I hate not skiing, but I guess I hate not having a brain even more, so I will behave myself!

Thanks to you all for your concerns and responses, and especially to Sally Miller and Gayle for taking such good care of me! ◆

New Mexico

Ski Apache Fights Fire With Snowmaking Guns

A massive wildfire in New Mexico has damaged some ski lifts at Ski Apache. The ski area fought the fire in the Lincoln National Forest, with its own snowmaking equipment, setting up guns around its base lodge to ward off the flames.

Utah

Utah Reports Lower Skier Days

Utah announced that it had 3,802,536 million skier day visits during the 2011-12 ski season — down 10 percent from the previous season's numbers.

Idaho

Creditor Seizes Tamarack Lift

Bank of America has removed the \$4 million Wildwood Express chairlift at bankrupt Tamarack Resort and stored it locally in preparation for sale. The Tamarack Municipal Association (TMA), a homeowners' group, has operated a portion of the resort for the past two winters, but the Wildwood lift was not part of that effort.

California

Town of Mammoth Lakes Files Bankruptcy

Mammoth Lakes has filed for bankruptcy over a \$43-million breach-of-contract judgment brought against the town by a real estate developer. The town plans to ask the bankruptcy court to approve a 10-year payment plan of about \$500,000 a year. That way it can operate with enough services to assure the safety of residents and tourists.



Mammoth to Close June Mountain

Mammoth Mountain Ski Area announced they will not operate June Mountain this summer and for the upcoming 2012-13 winter season. June has operated at an annual deficit each year since its purchase in 1986. Mammoth brought June in 1986 in the hopes of connecting the two ski resorts.

Colorado

Aspen to Harness Methane from Mines

The Aspen Skiing Co. is investing \$6 million to harvest methane emissions from a coal mine in Somerset, CO and convert the greenhouse gas into renewable energy for the local grid.

Aspen Skiing Company president and CEO, Mike Kaplan, said. "It's going to offset 100 percent of our energy consumption." It also will eliminate three times the company's annual carbon emissions, Kaplan claimed.

Echo Mountain Ski Area For Sale

Echo Mountain ski area, located just 35 miles from Denver, will be sold at auction in August. The 226-acre area had 32,000 skier visits and saw revenue climb 30 percent and daily ticket sales up 50 percent in what was a bad year for just about every other resort in the state.

Colorado Reports Lower Skier Days

Colorado Ski Country USA (CSCUSA) announced that its 22 member resorts hosted an estimated 6.16 million skier visits during the 2011-12 ski season, representing a decrease of 11.4 percent. These figures do not include those resorts owned by Vail Resorts — which is not a member of CSCUSA.

BRING A FRIEND challenge

Snow sports industry colleagues who created Learn to Ski and Snowboard Month organized the The Bring a Friend (BAF) Challenge.

The Challenge is not relegated to January but the goal is the same — introduce newcomers to skiing and/ or snowboarding by helping them sign up for lessons from professional instructors.

The "challenge" is to introduce at least one newcomer to skiing and/or snowboarding this winter by helping him/her enroll in a lesson program.

By doing so, both you and the newcomer are eligible to win some prizes from leading product suppliers and resorts. Current skiers and snowboarders can sign up as many newcomers as they wish. Each newcomer counts towards a new entry in the Challenge.

Canada

Big White & Silver Star under Separate Ownership

Big White and Silver Star resorts, which had been under a single ownership and operation for a decade, have split apart following the death of owner **Desmond Schumann** in April. Schuman's son, **Peter**, now runs Big White, and his daughter, **Jane Cann**, runs Silver Star.

New Ski Area in BC, Canada

A new 640 acre ski area, Kelowna Mountain is partially complete near Big White and Silver Star and above the town of Kelowna, B.C. The area will have a triple chairlift serving 14 runs plus a half pipe and rail park.

If your first ski day each new season delivers pain all over your body (even your brain) ponder a while on atrophy. The muscles used in skiing need attention the rest of the year. Seek sports that challenge you mentally and physically in skiing's off season, so you can enjoy skiing's on season with aplomb.

Eco Tours

You can get into mountain ecology to learn more about the mountains you ski. One resort offering guests a view into local ecology is Whistler Blackcomb. Water Ski Safety

Water skiing is a great way to have fun while enjoying boating. That said, it's not an activity to be undertaken without preparation. It requires some special skills by the boat operator and the skier, an understanding of hand signals, and demands a lot of attention to safety by both parties.

Know the Code

A skier must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket that has a high impact rating designed for water skiing.

An observer is required whose only job is to watch the skier, receive signals and

alert the boat operator if the skier falls.

The water skier should enter the water and move away from the boat before the boat's engine is started.

Wait for the skier to signal that he or she is ready to go. Skier should yell "hit it."

Pay attention to what the other boaters are doing and don't jeopardize your skier's safety by pulling in front of other boats.

The skier should never wrap any part of the tow line around his or her body. It's also a good idea to take off all jewelry.

The skier should stay aware of and avoid surroundings and potential hazards.

After falling or dropping, the skier should hold a ski up out of the water while waiting to be retrieved, and if necessary waves his or her arms.

Even if not required by state laws, the observer should fly a red flag while the skier is down in the water.

When approaching a skier, always keep the skier in view and on the operator's side of the boat.

Always shut off the engine before allowing the skier to board the boat.

Retrieve the towline as soon as possible to avoid other boats from running over your rope. •

Coast Guard Considers Mandating Adult Life jacket

An advisory panel to the U.S. Coast Guard gave its go-ahead to pursue federal regulations that would require adults to wear life jackets on certain boats.

The National Boating Safety Advisory Council asked the Coast Guard to consider mandating that anyone aboard a boat less than 18 feet long be required to wear a life jacket when underway. In addition it asks that all those being towed in water sports, riding personal watercraft, or in human-powered boats of any length be required to wear life jackets as well.

The 16-5 decision mirrors a trend among

state boating agencies to increase the number of people actually wearing Coast Guard-approved life jackets with the aim of reducing boating fatalities.

Unlike the Council recommendation, which would apply to all ages, most state laws apply just to children and specify varying age cutoffs, typically 12 and under.

The U.S. Forest Service estimates that 82 million people participated in boating in 2010 and Coast Guard statistics show 736 people died in boating accidents that year.

According to a Coast Guard mathematical model, if a 70 percent wear rate was achieved, mandating boaters nationwide to wear life jackets in boats less than 18 feet could save 71 lives each year.





KIDS' korner

GOOD STUFF for the kids & grandkids

Summer is here... water, sun and fun!.

While childhood memories are often filled with carefree days, emergency room doctors know it as "trauma season." Tragedies peak during the warmer months because children are supervised less, have more free time and engage in more outdoor activities.

Water Safety Tips for Kids—

- If you do not know how to swim, always wear a life jacket.
 - If you fall, get pushed in or accidentally get near deep water, a life jacket can keep you floating on the surface until you can get help. Even strong swimmers should wear a vest in deep or rough water.
- Swim with a buddy.
 You've probably heard this many times, but it's worth saying again. If you get into trouble, your friend can get help fast.
- Always go feet first into unfamiliar water.

There could be rocks or tree stumps in rivers and lakes. Even pools can be more shallow than they look. So always check out the depth of water before you dive in.

- If you see someone in trouble, signal the lifeguard or responsible adult.
 - Don't try to rescue the person yourself you could get pulled under the water. Wave your hands over your head to signal the lifeguard or another adult.
- Don't EVER pretend you are drowning.
 It wastes lifeguard's time and may take their attention away from someone who really needs help.
- It's a good idea to stay near people who know you and will notice if you are in trouble.
 - If you are with a group of people, have a check-in time and place to meet.

ALTA turns 75

Alta is one of the oldest ski areas in the US and one of three resorts for skiers only.

The community of Alta was established in 1871 as an offshoot of the silver mining operations in Little Cottonwood Canyon. A fire destroyed most of the town in 1878, then a cataclysmic avalanche in 1885—combined with the decline of mining—heralded a period of dormancy for the town. The area experienced a modest resurgence in mining in the 1900s, but the town declined again shortly thereafter, and was deserted with the exception of a few hardy miners who continued to intermittently prospect the area.

In 1935 the U.S. Forest Service retained the noted skier Alf Engen to hike into the area and determine its potential as a future ski area. Engen's reports expressed great promise for the area, and recommended the purchase of additional surrounding lands to form the ski area.

In 1937 a prominent Salt Lake City lawyer, Joe Quinney, along with other local businessmen, formed the Utah Winter Sports Association to oversee the development of skiing at Alta.

In the following year construction began on the original Collins chairlift, fashioned from a surplus mining ore tramway system that featured a clampcam bullwheel gripping a metal cable strung with single-seat chairs. Slow but dependable, it was just the third such lift in the United States, after Sun Valley and the Magic Mile at Timberline Lodge on Mount Hood. Alta opened to skiers for the first time on January 15, 1939, offering a single ride on the chair for 25 cents.

In May 1958, under the coordination of the Alf Engen Ski School, Alta hosted the first meeting of the National Ski Association of America (NSA) Certification of Ski Teachers Committee and National Professional Ski Instructors.

This one week "on-snow" conference was held for the purpose of establishing national certification standards. As a result of this gathering, former Alta instructor, Bill Lash, wrote and published a book titled Outline of Ski Teaching, which became the first complete ski instructors manual of skiing protocols which ultimately became known as the American Skiing Technique.

The Town of Alta was incorporated in 1970. Lee Bronson was appointed as first president of the Town. In 1972, Bill Levitt became the first elected president and the first Alta Planning Commission was appointed. In the early 1970s, a sewer line was installed the length of Little Cottonwood Canyon. The Town established an emergency dispatch center to provide support for the Alta



ALTA today

Alta ski area features long, straight, fall-line pitches. Among the most well known and most favored are High Rustler, Eddies High Nowhere, Stone Crusher and the Baldy Chutes. Though widely respected as one of the most challenging of in-bounds ski areas in the world, Alta has always viewed itself as a local's and family oriented ski area with some 40% of its terrain devoted to intermediate and beginner skiers.

Marshal's Office. The Alta Justice Court began operation in 1975; the first justice court in Alta since the 1870s.

In 1978 Alta developed its first stateapproved culinary water system, providing town water through the Bay City Mine tunnel. The Alta Fire Station was completed to house the volunteer fire department.


In 1981, the Alta Defense Fund, a non-profit organization, formed to assist the Town's efforts to manage growth. Later, the group incorporated as The Friends of Alta. Priorities include preservation of Alta's environment and heritage, protection of the watershed, and acquisition of lands in Albion Basin to remove them from unnecessary development.

2012 hall of fame HONOREES



Dick Dorworth ski racer and world speed record holder, wore many hats throughout his career. As a racer, he was collegiate All-American in 1962. In 1963, he set a record for speed at 170 mph in Portillo, Chile. After retiring, he did stints as a ski instructor and a U.S. Ski Team coach before putting pen to paper as a novelist and sports journalist.



Joe Pack, Olympican, began his career as a Nordic ski jumper until he was spotted by freestyle aerialist Trace Worthington, who directed Pack to freestyle. It was a good move, as Pack enjoyed 12 trips to the World Cup podium, three times for gold. Pack won silver at Deer Valley's freestyle aerial venue during the 2002 Olympics in front of a supportive hometown crowd.



Eva Twardokens rocketed into the public spotlight at the age of 17, gaining the ski world's attention as Junior Racer of the Year in 1982 and again in 1983. Her 12-year career saw 34 top-10 finishes, including three World Cup podiums and a sixth-place GS finish at the Lillehammer Olympics.




Mason Beekley was a history aficionado determined to ensure skiing's history be documented. He formed the International Skiing History Association in 1991, which is 2,000 members strong today and continues to publish Skiing Heritage magazine. Beekley also amassed a personal library of thousands of ski posters, photographs and art until his death in 2001.



Harold Leonard, along with partner Jerry Simon, created ski shows as we know them today, beginning with his inaugural show in 1958 outside of Chicago. He introduced the Ski Deck and brought athletes and entertainers to the skiing public, turning the ski show into a viable way to connect skiers with the resorts, gear and services they need.



Nick Badami, former owner of Alpine Meadows, CA, and Park City Mountain Resort, and CEO of Powdr Corp., went on to leadership roles at both the National Ski Areas Association and several governing committees of the 2002 Salt Lake Olympics. He died in 2008.



Phil Gravink is a ski-area management icon, transforming New York's Gore and New Hampshire's Loon mountains into successful resorts. He went on to pursue various leadership roles with the National Ski Areas Association, even serving as chairman from 1979 to 1980.




Typer Palmer made his mark on the ski community in 1969 as a junior champion. In 1971, Palmer became the first American man to finish in the top three in a World Cup race. It wouldn't be the last time: Palmer went on to win two World Cup slaloms before turning pro, racing on Bob Beattie's World Professional Ski Tour.





FOREST SERVICE— Water Rights Issue To Heat Up Soon

The U.S. Forest Service, responding to the NSAA lawsuit regarding water rights, claimed last month that the Forest Service has the legal right to attach restrictions to the water rights included in ski area permits. The issue will eventually be settled in the courts, with NSAA due to file its legal brief on June 1, with amicus briefs due by June 6. Those filings will bring the dispute into sharper focus, and indicate the level and type of support each side has.

In November 2011, the Forest Service inserted a new clause into its ski area permits regarding water rights. The Forest Service says it did so to ensure that water originating in streams on public lands remains dedicated to ski area operations, especially when a leaseholder sells to a new owner. The clause is intended to ensure that the water rights transferred to the new owner are used for ski area operations. The Forest Service claims that water rights language adopted in 2004 would allow resorts

to sell water rights for other purposes.

NSAA claimed that the new clause requires resorts on Federal land to relinquish control over water rights that are worth millions of dollars, value that resorts carry on their balance sheets. Removing those water rights could affect some areas' credit ratings, the resorts have argued.

The NSAA sued the Forest Service last January, claiming that the Forest Service failed to provide an opportunity for public comment on the changes under the National Forest Management Act, and that it failed to analyze the economic impacts of the permit change on small businesses, as required under the Regulatory Flexibility Act.

The Forest Service says that existing laws allow it to make administrative changes without comment or economic impact analysis. It will be up to the court to determine who is right.
