





Ski Season Numbers

The National Ski Areas Association's has reported that U.S. skier visits for the 2013–14 season reached 56.2 million, a decline of 1.3 percent from last season and below the 10-year average of 57.3 million. The severe drought on the West Coast resulted in a drought of ski days as well.



Crystal Mountain Avalanche

The bottom of the Crystal Mountain High Campbell chairlift was taken out by a large avalanche March 10, 2014. The area was closed and nobody was hurt. The avalanche was triggered by an explosive set by ski patrol at around 4:45 PM.

Idaho Updates Its Skier's Act

In an effort to reflect the changing landscape of the mountain resorts, Idaho is the latest state to update its bill that oversees ski areas.

The update expanded the skiing language to include snowboarding and other sliding devices. It also expanded uphill transportation to include wire ropes and conveyors.

New language regarding inherent risks was added in order to include, among others, avalanches, tree wells, snowmaking mounds and freestyle terrain.

USFS New Summer Policy

The U.S. Forest Service has finalized policy guidelines that will open opportunities for ski areas to develop and offer a variety of year-round recreation activities on the National Forests. The revised directives stem from the Ski Area Recreational Opportunity Enhancement Act of 2011.

The guidelines will be used by agency administrators to determine which summer recreation activities and associated facilities will be allowed on ski areas operating on national forests. There are 122 ski areas on nearly 180,000 acres of public land administered by the Forest Service.

The guidelines also address the types of facilities that will be permitted, as well as management of other recreational uses within the operational boundary of ski areas by the non-paying public, such as snowshoeing and hiking.

The Act specifically includes ziplines, mountain bike terrain parks and trails, disc golf courses and rope courses. The Act requires that new activities are natural resource-based that encourage outdoor recreation & enjoyment of nature.

Vail Resorts was among the first to develop plans to put the Act into practice. ■

Bass sells majority SNOWBIRD

Texas oilman Dick Bass announced that he has sold his majority interest in the Little Cottonwood Canyon resort to lan Cumming, a businessman whose family owns Park City Mountain Resort (PCMR). The price and terms of the deal were not disclosed.

Bass, who will remain chairman of Snowbird's board, said in a news release he was pleased that his family and Cumming's could join together to direct the resort's future development, including the long-discussed and highly controversial plan to build a restaurant around the Tram terminal atop Hidden Peak.

How the purchase of Snowbird by the Cumming family — but not by Powdr Corp. — impacts the PCMR-Canyons litigation remains unclear.

Last May, Talisker Corp. brought in Vail Resorts to run Canyons Resort and to take over the lead in a high-profile lawsuit against PCMR's parent company, Powdr Corp., that could result in PCMR losing access to most of its mountainside.



With nearly two full seasons under its belt, the new ownership group at Brian Head Resort has decided to take the plunge and install a new high-speed detachable quad to replace the 4,840-foot long Giant Steps triple chair.

Frontier Charges for Carry-ons

Frontier Airlines has completely unbundled its economy fare, which means customers must pay a fee for carry-on bags in addition to checked bags and seat assignments.

The new policy is in effect for travel booked on and after April 28, 2014.

Customers are allowed to bring aboard one personal item for free (handbag, purse, pocketbook, backpack, briefcase or laptop), but an additional carry-on will cost \$25 at the time of initial travel purchase at Frontier's website or the airline's call center.

Paying for a carry-on at airport check-in will cost \$35; at the gate, \$50.

Frontier's Ascent and Summit level members of its EarlyReturns loyalty program will continue to receive a free carry-on bag and two free checked bags.

By unbundling, Frontier said its lowest fares have been reduced by an average of 12% on nonstop routes.

Frontier has followed Spirit Airlines in charging for carry-on luggage, and it also has imitated Spirit with the launch of a travel savings club.

The club, called Discount Den, offers special deals and savings on checked and carry-on bags.

Park City - Talisker Saga

Park City Mountain Resort (PCMR) will finally get their wish. Judge Ryan Harris today ordered both PCMR and Talisker Land Holdings (PCMR's landlord) to sit down with a formal, neutral, third-party mediator to try to resolve a land battle that threatens to leave Park City, Utah,

without its anchor resort for 2014/15.

PCMR has said since the beginning that Talisker has refused to negotiate and simply won't rest until they take over the ski area. Today's hearing involved PCMR's attempt to stay the eviction order affirmed by Harris on May 21.

Talisker and Vail Resorts wanted PCMR out in 60 days but the Judge issued a one-two punch with his ruling.

- 1) the eviction order stands, but
- 2) the 60-day timeclock won't start until after both sides mediate on August 15, 2014, and there's a hearing on August 27 regarding damages on both sides and rents owing.

Park City resorts to host 2019 World Championships



The International Ski Federation (FIS) announced that the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Association (USSA), in partnership with the Olympic community of Park City and State of Utah, has been awarded the 2019 World Championships for freestyle, freeskiing and snowboarding.

The bid features a partnership of three resorts for an event that will host at least 12 competitions over 10 days in February 2019. **Deer Valley** will host the freestyle skiing events of moguls and aerials, which is in keeping with its

snowboarding ban. **Park City Mountain Resort** will host halfpipe, slopestyle and big air skiing and snowboarding. Rounding it out, **Canyons** will take on the skicross and snowboardcross.

The 2019 World Championships will be a major global event featuring the largest showcase of winter action sports outside the Olympics. Partnership with FIS and other athletic sanctioning bodies, together with the State of Utah and Park City community will help to shape this as an historic event in freestyle, freeskiing and snowboarding.

The world is abuzz with Sustainability

Snow is a critical factor for skiing and snowboarding, so if your favorite ski resort hasn't made the connection between climate change and their resort, they clearly don't get it. Your resort should be placing a strong focus on protecting their land, water resources, energy use, waste and a lot more.

Rated by the Ski Area Citizen's Coalition, the grades are based on 35 environmental criteria in four main categories: habitat protection, watershed protection, addressing climate change, and environmental policies and practices.

An "A" grade means the resort has a strong program focused on protecting their environment. A "B" grade or below means the resort needs to ramp up their policies. Below is the 2013 list of the 6 resorts rated greenest in the US— all in the West!



Park City Mountain Resort

Park City Mountain Resort lands the top grade for sustainability with 93%. With a strong focus on habitat and watershed protection, PCMR knows their ecosystem is super important. In 2011, the resort installed a solar array and vertical wind turbine, which produce around 30,000 kWh's annually.



Stevens Pass Ski Resort

Coming in second is Stevens Pass Ski Resort in eastern Washington with a grade of 92.3%. The resort has a strong commitment to protecting and restoring the natural resources and has a long list of sustainability campaigns to reduce their impact and educate their guests.



China Peak Mtn. Resort, CA

Located up from Fresno, China Peak Mountain Resort lands 3rd place with a score of 91.7%. The western Sierra resort is dedicated to the concepts of reduce, re-use and recycle to minimize their footprint. The resort is ultra committed to protecting the forest and the land and works with Cal Poly and local nurseries to ensure the vegetation is healthy.



Sugar Bowl, CA

The resort is powered by 100% green energy and offers visitors the chance to offset their carbon emissions. They are also dedicated to green building with the help of energy efficiency and community education.



Deer Valley Resort, UT

Rated as the #1 Resort in the US by Ski Magazine, Deer Valley Resort in Park City is the #5 resort in terms of sustainability with a score of 89.6%. As stewards of the land, the resort has an overall sustainability plan that they work from. While they're still a bit behind when it comes to addressing climate change, the resort is on their way.



Aspen Highlands, CO

Aspen Highlands, which is part of Aspen/Snowmass in Colorado has the 6th best score with 88.3% (Aspen Mountain Ski Resort is #7). Aspen Skiing Company has a number of LEEd certified buildings and has their own environmental foundation. The environmental protection program is stellar and hopefully they'll be ramping up their climate change programs soon.

GOOD STUFF for the kids & grandkids

Fun & Safe in the Sun— Summer Safety Tips

You want the kids to be active and have fun, but there are potential hazards, so keep them safe to enjoy these days of freedom and outdoor activities.

Sun safety

The sun can quickly burn tender skin. Most children get 20-80 percent of lifetime exposure to the sun before they turn 18! Always make sure your kids are wearing sunscreen before they head outdoors, and reapply every two hours. Sweat and water will wash the protection away! Infants should be kept out of direct sunlight and wear sunprotective clothing. Teach toddlers and older kids to grab a hat with a brim for additional protection.

Hydration

Make sure kids drink plenty of water on hot summer days. Dizziness and nausea are just two of the signs of overheating, which can lead to heat exhaustion. Sugary drinks and carbonated beverages containing caffeine can actually accelerate dehydration.

Never leave an infant or child unattended in a car. This rule is more critical than ever in hot months when the temperature inside a vehicle can soar to above 100 degrees in a matter of minutes. That heat is deadly.

Bike safety

Kids have bike-related injuries every year, but these accidents can be avoided or minimized with some precautions. Your child should always wear a helmet when riding. This protective gear reduces the risk of head injury by as much as 85 percent.

Explain rules for safe play — riding only on the sidewalk or designated bike path, no riding near cars and no side-trips that put them in danger from traffic or natural hazards.



Water safety

Enroll kids in swim lessons taught by a certified instructor. Always have children wear proper-fitting life vests in a boat or near deep water. Take precautions if you have a home pool. Children need constant supervision around water.

Boundaries

Children relish the freedom of summer, but set some boundaries. Have them play within sight and sound of home, or by arrangement at a friend's where there will be adult supervision. Until they reach a certain age and maturity, kids should not go to the park or other places alone. Parents must always know exactly where their children are and whom they are with.

Untouchables

Kids are naturally curious so keep household, yard and garage dangers stored away. Weed killers and yard chemicals, radiator coolant and other solvents are poisonous to children and pets. Keep them out of sight and out of reach.

Fenced in

If possible, provide a safe play area for your children that's fenced in and in sight from the house. Ideally this space will have room for them to run and play, be cleared of items that are hazards (lawnmowers, sharp gardening implements, etc.) and have a shaded area so kids can get out of the hot sun.



Quick tip

Even a small wading pool can pose a danger to toddlers. Never allow small children in the water without an adult to supervise! Since water reflects sunlight, be sure the kids are protected with sunscreen and not exposed to direct sun for too long before it is reapplied.

Mountain Pose

Mountain pose is a great way to start your practice. It may not seem physically challenging but it will help you take a moment to stand strong and just breath. Mountain pose is the foundation for standing poses.



Place your feet parallel and hip distance apart with your arms by your sides and palms facing forward.

Ground down through your feet and engage your quadriceps as you lift both knee caps up.

Spin your inner thighs toward the wall behind you as you draw your tailbone toward the floor.

Stand tall and relax the tops of your shoulders as you expand across your collar bones and broaden through your shoulder blades.

Imagine yourself as a sturdy and powerful mountain.

Tree Pose

Tree pose is a perfect complement for the balance needed when skiing or snowboarding and strengthens your legs while stretching your groin and inner thigh area.



Stand in Mountain Pose. Bring all of your weight on to your left leg. Bend your right knee and slowly lift your right leg up only as far as you can while still remaining steady. Rotate your right leg so your knee points toward the right.

Place your right foot on your left leg (either above or below the knee but directly on the side of your knee) with your toes point toward the floor. Bring your hands together at your heart and find one spot in front of you to gaze at for stability.

If you feel stable enough, raise your arms up over head and reach your fingertips toward the ceiling. When you are ready to come out of the pose slowly lower your arms then remove your foot from your leg and slowly lower your foot to the ground. Repeat on the other side.

Chair Pose

Chair pose is an excellent pose mimicking a ski stance. It strengthens the legs as well has helps with balance.



Stand in Mountain Pose. Inhale as you bend your knees and sweep your arms out and overhead with the palm facing each other. Sit back as if you were going to sit down in a chair.

For tight shoulders keep your arms wide. Soften your shoulders away from your ears. If your front ribs start to puff out, soften them in towards the body and broaden between the bottom of your shoulders blades.

Maintain a neutral pelvis, draw your sit bones toward the floor and release your inner thighs toward the floor. Press firmly into your feet and extend all the way through your fingertips.

On an inhale straighten your legs and exhale as you release your arms back to your sides.

Plank

Plank is a great pose for building core strength as well as upper arm strength. You can always modify the pose by bringing your knees to the floor at first and working your way up to the full pose.



Start on all fours and place your hands on the floor shoulder distance apart with your fingertips pointing forward.

Step your feet back into a high pushup position.

Adjust your shoulders so they are directly over your wrists and straighten your arms.

Imagine a line of energy from the crown of your head, through your shoulders, hips and then extending through your heels.

Start with the traditional plank and move your self up. Keep track of how long or how many reps you can do of the variations and track your progress! Remember, have fun with it, rest when your body needs rest, and progress at your own speed and for you ability! It's not about the 6-pack, it is about strength, stabilization, and balance!

Ardha Matsyendrasana

Twists are great for keeping the spine long and supple. This seated twist also stretches your side hips and butt.



Sit on the floor with both legs extend straight in front of you. Bend your left leg and place your left foot on the outside of your right leg (your left foot is flat on the floor and knee pointed toward the ceiling).

Bend your right leg and slide your right heel so that it is next to the outside of your left hip (your right knee is now on the floor pointing straight in front of you). Place your left fingertips on the floor behind you and use your arm like a little kickstand to lengthen up through your spine.

Inhale reach your right arm straight up as you lengthen your spine. Exhale as you twist to the left, bend your right arm and hook your elbow on the outside of your left knee (palm facing away from you and fingers pointing toward the ceiling).

Gaze your left shoulder. On an exhale slowly come back to center. Repeat on the other side.

Warrior II Pose

This is a great pose to strengthen your legs and open your hips, plus its foundation is reminiscent of a snowboard stance.



Step wide along the long side of a yoga mat. Check your stance by holding your arms out in a T shape.

The general guide is that your ankles are under your wrists. From deep within your right hip socket rotate your right leg 90 degrees so your toes point toward the right short side of your mat.

Slip your left heel back so that your left toes are now slightly turned in. Inhale raise your arms shoulder height and exhale bend your right knee until it is directly over your right ankle.

Turn your head, without turning your torso, and gaze over your right finger tips. Keep your legs strong and active, lengthen up through the torso and avoid collapsing over the right thigh.

Stretch out vigorously through all of your fingers and soften your shoulders away from your ears. On an inhale come up out of the pose and then repeat on the other side.


HISTORY big pines park

the birth of MOUNTAIN HIGH

Los Angeles County established a recreational facility at Big Pines, CA in 1923

Big Pines, just 4 miles west of Wrightwood in the Angeles National Forest, began as a year-round recreation area built by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and the Department of Parks and Recreation and opened for Labor Day in 1924.



Big Pines Recreation Camp (elevation 6,862 feet) had cabins, a dining room, fountain and store. Many of the buildings still stand— most notably one of the two stone towers that once supported a pedestrian overpass across Highway 2, west of Wrightwood.



The arch was designed and erected by William Davidson and donated by him to the County of Los Angeles. There was a stairway inside the tower that led to an arched doorway, opening onto the arch. In 1926 the Arch was dedicated in a special ceremony.

Winter sports attracted thousands of visitors as soon as the first snow fell. A variety of activities was available, both at Big Pines and Jackson Lake. Parking at

the junction of Big Pines Highway and Blue Ridge Road was common.



Toboggan slides were built at several areas in Big Pines Park. These were made of U-shaped sheet iron on wooden frames. The slides were placed on fairly steep slopes with a good end run out.



In 1929 a world-class ski jump structure was built at Big Pines, CA in time for the Third Annual Winter Sports Carnival. Several world record-breaking jumps were made at Big Pines, including Alf Engen's 243 foot jump.

It was hoped that the completion of the jump would convince the International Olympic Committee to award the 1932 Winter Olympic Games to Big Pines. Alas it was perceived that California (Tahoe also bid) did not have the necessary facilities. The 1932 Winter Olympic Games were awarded to Lake Placid.

In the late 1930s and early 1940s, as ski tows and chairlifts began to spring up in winter sports areas, the popularity of ski jumping declined and skiers seeking easy uphill access for their downhill runs



began flocking to the slopes.

In the early 1930s, the LA County Board of Supervisors realized they were in financial trouble at Pig Pines Park. Along with the rising maintenance costs for many of the facilities, the effects of the Great Depression had taken their toll.

In 1934 the board proposed that USFS take back control of the park. In 1940 after years of negotiations, the Forest Service cancelled the permit and took back control over a 12-month period.

Now administered by the USFS, Big Pines continues to be a popular recreation area encompassing three ski resorts, several campgrounds and Jackson Lake.

In 1939 Harlow Dormer started a ski resort at Table Mountain and built the first rope tow in Southern California. In 1941 Blue Ridge was built on the former slopes of Big Pines Park. In 1948 Sepp Benedikter began development of Holiday Hill.



Today, the three ski resorts are collectively known as Mountain High. ■

Getting There

 Beware of Any Travel Alerts and Warnings for Your Destination

The State Department issues Travel Warnings to recommend postponing travel to a country because of civil unrest, dangerous conditions or terrorism.



 Do You Have All Required Travel Documents?

Most U.S. citizens must use a U.S. passport to travel overseas and reenter the United States.

If you are traveling by land or sea, you may travel using the new U.S. passport card instead of the normal passport book.

Some countries may require travelers to present proof of relationship to the children and evidence of consent from any non-accompanying parent(s).

Some countries require that a traveler's passport be valid for at least six months beyond the dates of the trip.

Are You Prepared for an Emergency?

Make sure you have the contact information for the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate where you are going.

• Do You Plan to Drive Overseas?

If you plan to drive overseas, you may need to obtain an International Driving Permit (IDP).

If you will be residing overseas for an extended time, obtain a local driver's license as soon as possible.

Pack Smart!

Pack light so you can move quickly and have a free hand when you need it.

Carry a minimum number of valuables and plan places to conceal them.

Use covered luggage tags to avoid casual observation of your identity and nationality.

Avoid packing IDs, tickets and other vital documents in backpacks or other locations you won't be able to see at all times.

 Do You Have Photocopies of Your Itinerary and Travel Documents?

Make two photocopies of all your travel documents in case of emergency or if your documents are lost or stolen.

Leave one copy with a friend or relative at home. It is always a great idea to let at least one person know exactly where you will be staying and how to contact you in an emergency.

Carry the other copy with you stored separately from the originals.

Documents to make copies of include Passport, visa, itinerary, confirmations, airline ticket, driver's license and credit cards.

Your Money

• Prepare to Handle Money Overseas

Check and understand the exchange rate before you travel. Notify your

bank, credit card company, or other financial institutions that you are going overseas. Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Do not flash large amounts of money when paying a bill.

· Learn about local laws and customs

If you break local laws while abroad, your U.S. passport won't help you avoid arrest or prosecution. The U.S. Embassy can't get you out of jail.

Your Health

Do You Need Any New Vaccinations?

Vaccinations are required for entry to some countries and require foreign visitors carry an international certificate of vaccination or yellow card.

Health experts recommend vaccinations for travel to some countries.

- Do You Know How to Find Medical Help Abroad?
- Does Your Health Insurance Cover You Outside the U.S.?

If your insurance policy does not cover you abroad, consider purchasing a short-term policy that does.

NOTE: Social Security and Medicare do not provide coverage outside of the U.S.

• If you take prescription medication?

Pack enough to last your entire trip, including some extra for just in case you need extra.

Carry your medications in their original labeled containers in your carry-on bag.

Ask your pharmacy or physician for the generic equivalent name of your prescriptions.

Get a letter from your physician in case you are questioned about your carry-on medication. ■



We have gotten into the groove of running early and late season ski weeks to Big White Ski Resorts in Canada. These trips run about \$700 per person and include hotel lodging (double


occupancy), 6-day lift ticket, ground transfer from/to the Kelowna airport and various parties. We believe that Big White offers the best and most consistent early and late snow.



Conduct Policy

- ◆ Participants who violate our Conduct Policy may be excluded from future trips without reimbursement of expenses. ■
